**Dear Gary** 

Thank you for your emails of 17, 20 and 21 February 2023 to the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) requesting answers to questions regarding Registered Valuer operations following Cyclone Gabrielle.

Following a significant event, Rapid Building Assessors work to quickly assess the damage to buildings within the affected area(s). After a building assessment by a Rapid Building Assessor, a building may be given one of three coloured placards: red, yellow or white.

In the case of white placards, Registered Valuers need only the permission of the building owner, occupier or otherwise authorised person to enter the building.

A yellow placard means that access to the building is restricted and must be supervised by a person authorised by the issuing authority (as noted on the placard¹), for a limited time, or entry is restricted to certain parts of the building.

A red placard means that entry to the building is prohibited except with written authorisation from the Civil Defence Emergency Management Controller or other responsible person. A red placard is issued if a building has sustained moderate or heavy damage and poses a significant risk to health or life. This could be from the building itself, from external factors such as adjacent buildings, or from ground failure.

Contact should be made with the local territorial authority in the first instance to discuss access to buildings with red or yellow placards.

Registered Valuers will need to comply with conditions and restrictions set out by the placard and the issuing authority, including supervision and/or time limitations. Information about the local issuing authority may be found on the placard.

Registered valuers are not considered "authorised officials". Authorised civil defence or territorial authority officials are provided with statutory emergency management powers to keep people safe and manage affected buildings when a state of emergency, transition period or designation is in force. For example, authorised officials are given statutory authority to enter buildings or land to carry out rapid building assessments. This is provided for in the Building Act 2004.

In response to your question about public health orders, no such orders have been issued following the recent cyclone. Businesses and organisations need to comply with their obligations under the *Health* and Safety at Work Act 2015, as well as with any directions from Civil Defence Emergency Management. MBIE, WorkSafe, CHASNZ and Tenancy Services have published information on their websites about keeping safe as well as employer responsibilities and what to do after a natural disaster.
